#### 2018 Conservationist of the Year

Weber and Weber Farms, located between Arlington and Henderson, have been selected as this year's Sibley SWCD conservationists of the year. They operate a 2,200-acre farm, along with 25 head of beef cattle. Over the years, the Webers have installed several terraces and a grade stabilization structure. In addition, they've restored over 70 acres of wetlands, providing wildlife habitat through the Re-invest In Minnesota (RIM) and the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) programs. Being involved in the Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP), the Webers have improved nutrient and pest management application techniques. They've installed drift-reducing nozzles, lowered their boom height, implemented GPS targeted spraying and plant tissue testing and analysis. The Webers are stewards of the land and the Sibley SWCD would like to thank them for their conservation efforts!

## **Erosion Watch**

This crop year has been marked by some extreme rain events this past year, especially in June. Due to the intensity of these rains, folks may, or may not be, surprised to find some serious soil erosion in their fields during harvest.

There are many types of erosion, most commonly it becomes noticeable once it forms a small eroded gully along a draw or concentrated water flow area. Most often, these areas get tilled over each year, the gully appears to be gone and the land sits ready for another spring. Although it may not seem like much soil has been lost, in reality, these ephemeral erosion areas continue to remove topsoil from the land each year as our rainfalls become increasingly more intense and the gully reforms. Eventually, the continuation of this cycle will

yield to larger, classic gullies that become difficult to cross and more expensive to treat.

Solutions do exist to treat these issues, and you are strongly encouraged to contact your local SWCD and UDSA NRCS for assistance in managing erosion. SWCD staff can work to create a management plan for you that would guide you toward controlling your erosion issues through various programs. #### Middle Minnesota Watershed Planning Strategy and the Watershed Planner

Local, state, and federal agencies have come together to target conservation in the Middle Minnesota Watershed. Jennifer Hahn, the Middle MN Watershed Planner, will be working with the conservation offices and producers in Blue Earth, Brown, Cottonwood, Le Sueur, Nicollet, Redwood, Renville and Sibley Counties. She will

work with landowners and operators on their resource concerns provide plans and designs to address those concerns, and connect the producers to programs for financial assistance. This includes feedlots, erosion control projects, ravine stabilizations, soil health, prescribed grazing, wetland restorations, nutrient and pest management, just to name a few.

Jennifer grew up on a dairy farm that now runs corn and soybeans and has been assessing and providing conservation planning since 2005 in Minnesota. She also spent time analyzing profitability of conservation practices to help producers increase their return on investment (ROI).

## So You Didn't Get Your Buffer In, What's Next?

The Sibley SWCD would like to thank all of those who have seeded their buffers and are compliant with the 2015 Buffer Law. Producers of Sibley County have really stepped up and led by example, showing they truly care about conservation while still being agriculturally productive and sustainable. We understand not every landowner was in favor of this law; however, we heard the comment from a lot of producers that when it comes right down to it, the buffer strips would have a positive impact.

We had a lot of questions about the deadline for the public ditches this past November 1, mainly what happens if I don't/didn't get the buffer seeded in? According to Article 330 of the Sibley County buffer ordinance, when the County identifies a potential non-compliance with the buffer law requirements or receives a third party complaint from a private individual or entity or from another public agency, staff will consult with the SWCD to determine the appropriate course of action to document compliance status. If determined to be non-compliant, the County will send out notification of this status via certified mail. The landowner would then fall under one of two categories, initial violation or repeat violation. I have included an excerpt from the Administrative Penalty Order (APO) listing the penalty process for both categories:

**330.6.2.1** Initial violation. The penalty for a landowner on a single parcel that has not previously been the subject of an APO issued by the County shall be:


- I. \$0 per parcel per month for 11 months after receipt of the Corrective Action Notice;
- II. \$50 per parcel per month for the first six (6) months (180 days) following the time period in paragraph 330.6.2.1 i; and
- III. \$200 per parcel per month after six (6) months (180 days) following the time period in paragraph 330.6.2.1

**330.6.2.2 Repeat violation.** The penalty for a landowner on a single parcel that has previously been the subject of an APO issued by the County shall be:

- I. \$50 per parcel per day for 180 days after receipt of the Corrective Action Notice; and
- II. \$200 per parcel per day after 180 days following the time period in paragraph 330.6.2.2 i.

## **Following Your Seed Plan**

When you signed up for a conservation project that involved planting natural vegetation, you received a seeding plan. It's an extremely important document! By adhering to it, you ensure you will get paid for your conservation improvements. If you deviate from this plan or change it in any way, without prior approval from Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) or Farm Service Agency (FSA) staff, you could jeopardize your payment and possibly future participation in conservation projects.

Within your seeding plan, please pay close attention to the following:

**Seeding Dates:** This gives you a SPECIFIC window of time to seed your project (for example, May

15 to June 30 for a warm season planting). If inclement weather interferes with

your planting, contact the NRCS office to amend your contract.

**Acres:** A map and all documentation within your contract shows the exact

location and number of acres to be planted.

**Species:** If you want to make substitutions to species in your mix, you do need

pre-approval to do so. Every practice (CP-21 or CP-23) have different seeds per square foot and ratio of grass to forbs (flowers) requirements, making it imperative

to have it reviewed if changes are made.

**Planting Methods:** Drill or drop seeders, packing, rolling, inter-seeding and dormant

seeding options and recommendations are outlined.

In addition, your seeding plan includes guidelines for preparation of your seedbed (cultivation, herbicides, weed reduction, etc.), seeding depth, grass-forb mix percentages and maintenance methods (i.e., burning, chemical and/or mechanical).

Seeding standards are based on pure live seed (PLS). PLS is a means of expressing seed quality. PLS is the percentage of seed (i.e. good viable seed) that has the potential to germinate within a measured one-pound weight of any seed lot. Nearly all species recommended for conservation plantings by NRCS uses Pure Live Seed (PLS) expressed in pounds per acre as the basis for the calculation of seeding rates. One exception to this rule is the use of bulk planting rates for traditionally used agronomic crops (e.g. wheat, oats, annual ryegrass, etc.). PLS provides a

basis for comparing the quality of seed lots of the same species that differ in purity and germination. The use of PLS guarantees that the same amount of viable seed per acre is planted even though different seed lots with varying quality may be used.

All conservation plant mixes <u>MUST</u> meet seeding standards. If you have questions about your specific mix, contact the NRCS office <u>BE-FORE</u> purchasing the seed.

It's important to remember: You must turn in all seed tags, seed bills, site preparation charges, seeding bills and weed-control bills prior to cost-share being approved. When you begin a conservation project, you are also given a seed vendor list to guide you in choosing your plant supplier(s).
