2017 Conservationist of the Year

Paul and Donita Platz of Lafayette, have been selected by the Sibley SWCD as this year's conservationist of the year. They operate a 900 acre farm consisting of corn, soybeans, sweet corn, and peas. In addition, they finish 15,000 pigs a year. Over the years, the Platzs have been very conservation minded leading them to install grassed waterways, terraces and removing open intakes. They have protected their soils by using minimal tillage and planting cover crops. Paul and Donita are proud to have voluntarily planted buffer strips along their ditches long before the buffer law was introduced. Being involved in the Conservation Stewardship Program, the Platzs have and still partake in numerous pest and nutrient management activities, nitrogen testing, GPS target spraying, plant tissue testing, grid sampling, installing drift reducing nozzles and planting wildlife food plots.

The Platzs have a real interest in renewed energy and have installed dual axis tracking solar panels producing 70,000 kW per year supplying all of the electricity to their hog barns. Paul and Donita are very active within their community, volunteering regularly at church, FFA and the Southern MN Crisis Nursery. The Platzs are stewards of the land and the district would like to thank them for their dedication to conservation.

The Minnesota Buffer Law

Still many discussions in our office revolve around the 2015 MN Buffer Law. This law has led me, as well as others in the office, to conversations with many familiar and some new faces throughout the county. First, we need to clear up some of the confusion about the term "buffer" we hear in the office. A buffer, also known as a filter strip, is an area of vegetated land adjacent to a body of water such as a ditch, stream or lake. Buffers help to filter excess nutrients/sediment, preventing them from entering our waters. Buffers also stabilize soil and protect riparian corridors. Governor Dayton signed this buffer initiative into law in 2015 to enhance the protection of Minnesota's waters, arguably the state's best resource!

Now that the compliance date for public waters has come and gone, it's time to focus on public ditches. The law states that for all <u>public ditches</u>, a 16.5-foot, or one rod, buffer of perennial vegetation <u>must be in place by November 1st, 2018</u>. To identify parcels you own or rent, view the finalized map completed by the DNR, found at the following, which will direct you right to the map: http://arcgis.dnr.state.mn.us/gis/buffersviewer/. If you do not have computer access, feel free to stop by our office and we can help you through the process. On this map, waterways lined in green are the areas labeled public ditches.

One way to meet compliance is to request financial assistance through the buffer cost share program. The Sibley SWCD has received a grant from the state to administer a Buffer Cost Share program, in which the SWCD can offer landowners assistance towards achieving compliance. This money is available to implement buffer strips at a rate of \$300 per acre adjacent to public ditches. This money is only available to sign up for until **March 1st**, **2018**, so hurry in before the money runs out! These funds can only be used to reach compliance.

Another popular program to achieve compliance is through the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP). This program offers eligible landowners/producers yearly rental payments to set aside land like these buffer strips. CRP contracts also provide some cost share opportunities for activities towards establishment and management, making this a very viable option for bringing your buffer into compliance with the law. USDA is currently on hold for accepting new offers due to the unknown of meeting the national CRP acreage cap of 24 million acres.

A third option for landowners is to enroll into the CREP program. CREP is a voluntary, federal-state funded natural resource conservation program. Landowners enroll in the federally-funded Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) for the first 14-15 years. CRP is administered by the USDA-Farm Service Agency (FSA). The same land is also enrolled into a state-funded perpetual conservation easement through the Reinvest in Minnesota (RIM) Reserve program, administered by the Minnesota Board of Water and Soil Resources (BWSR). Private ownership continues and the land is permanently restored and enhanced for conservation benefits.

The last option is for you, the landowner/operator, to seed this area yourselves. This has been very popular for those that can utilize hay for feed. Many landowners have come in, and in the end, decided this option would best suit them due to the fact that they can regularly hay/cut these areas. Keep in mind perennial vegetation must be maintained to suffice the Buffer Law. If you have planted your buffer on your own, please contact the office so that when tracking compliance we can mark your buffer as compliant.

It's a very busy but exciting time in conservation right now. We at the SWCD look forward to working with you on implementing these buffer strips on your property! <u>USDA Processing Pending Conservation Reserve Program Continuous Enrollment Offers</u> *Acceptance of Most 2018 Offers Temporarily Suspended*

There has been a lot of interest in the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) over the last year in Sibley County. With the new fiscal year there are also a few updates. Notice has been received from the USDA National office that going forward the authority to accept Continuous CRP offers has been suspended. This means that Sibley County USDA will not be accepting new CRP offers until new guidance is received.

The soil rental rates have also been reviewed and revised to more accurately reflect the changing rental rates in Sibley County. The previous soil rental rates for Sibley County ranged from \$231.00 to \$346.00 per acre depending on soil types. The new rates effective for fiscal year 2018 range from \$124.00 to \$346.00 per acre.

All current, eligible CRP continuous enrollment offers made through Sept. 30, 2017, except for those made under the Pollinator Habitat Initiative (CP42), will be approved. Additionally, FSA is temporarily suspending acceptance of most offers going forward to provide time to review CRP allocation levels, and to avoid exceeding the statutory cap of 24 million acres.

The CRP acreage cap is a provision of the 2014 Farm Bill. Current enrollment is about 23.5 million acres nationwide. USDA is accepting all pending continuous enrollment offers that were made beginning on May 4, 2017, and extending through Sept. 30, 2017, except Pollinator Habitat Initiative offers. Pollinator acreage offers are being declined because the program has met its acreage enrollment goal. Effective immediately, USDA is suspending acceptance of all new CRP continuous offers received or submitted after Sept. 30, 2017. The suspension will continue until later in the 2018 fiscal year.

However, FSA will continue to accept eligible offers for state-specific Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP) and CRP Grasslands enrollment. Offers received on or after Oct. 1, 2017, are subject to fiscal year 2018 rental rates, which have been adjusted to reflect current market conditions and were established after careful review of the latest USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) cash rent data.

In return for enrolling in CRP, USDA, through FSA, provides participants with rental payments and cost-share assistance. Landowners enter into contracts that last between 10 and 15 years. CRP pays farmers and ranchers who remove sensitive lands from production and plant certain grasses, shrubs and trees that improve water quality, prevent soil erosion and increase wildlife habitat. Payment totals for 2017 were announced

earlier this week totaling over \$1.6 billion.

Sibley County Subsurface Sewage Treatment System (SSTS) Loan Program

Looking to manage your subsurface sewage? The Sibley County Ag BMP loan program may be an option for you if there are no other programs that fit your situation. Sibley County administers the loan program through the Minnesota Department of Agriculture. Additional requirements include a completed application, an approved septic plan, and a septic system permit. Taxes on the property cannot be delinquent. A loan can be up to 10 years in length with a 3% interest rate on any unpaid balance. Stop by the SWCD Office or call Ron Otto at 507-702-7077 for any questions or to pick up an application.
